



**PARTICIPATION OF SOCIAL ACTORS IN THE ACTIVITIES
OF THE SUMMITS OF THE AMERICAS PROCESS**

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FINAL REPORT
Summit Lab: Artificial Intelligence for Civil Society and Social Actors of the Americas

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Introduction

This report provides an overview of the Capacity Building Workshop “Artificial Intelligence for Civil Society” for Civil Society Organizations and Social Actors that are engaged or interested in the Summit of the Americas Process. This workshop was organized by the Executive Secretariat for Integral Development (OAS-SEDI), serving as Technical Secretariat of the Inter-American Committee of Science and Technology (COMCYT), and the Summit of the Americas Secretariat (SAS). The workshop was held virtually from March 15 to 21, 2024.

In the second semester of 2024, the OAS will convene the Seventh Meeting of Ministers and High Authorities of Science and Technology in Washington, D.C., during which multiple strategic partners from the Inter-American Committee of Science and Technology (COMCYT), including universities, NGOs, professional and civil society associations, and other national and international organizations will be invited to participate. The Executive Secretariat for Integral Development (SEDI) supports the Science and Technology Ministerial process as Technical Secretariat of the OAS-COMCYT. It is expected that the use, development, and deployment of safe, secure, and trustworthy Artificial Intelligence (AI) in the Americas will be among the key issues to be considered at the Ministerial.

As part of the Ministerial process, the OAS-SEDI supported the organization of a joint workshop, in collaboration with the Summits Secretariat of the OAS, to engage, teach, learn and exchange perspectives from civil society actors and associations on the use, impacts, benefits and risks of AI for sustainable, inclusive, and equitable development as a foundation for democracy, security and human rights. The workshop was implemented with the technical support of two of the OAS Centers of Excellence, the National Center on Artificial Intelligence of Chile (CENIA) and the Center of Excellence on Robotics and AI (AUDACIA) of Universidad Simon Bolivar, in Colombia.

The capacity building workshop was designed under a 3-session format, which included a 3-hour theoretical session, followed by another 3-hour practical session, and a final 3-hour dialogue and exchange of good practices among civil society organizations and social actors on the use, development, and deployment of a safe, secure, and trustworthy AI. The workshop was imparted in Spanish by the AUDACIA Colombia, and in English by CENIA Chile.

Summary of Theoretical and Practical Sessions, and Dialogue

The main purpose of the workshop was to provide members of civil society with the necessary tools and skills to learn the basic concepts of AI (what it is and what is not, how is AI changing economies, societies, and industries, what are the available AI tools and how to use them). Additionally, the instructors empowered participants with the know-how to leverage the AI tools to positively influence their activities and communities.

The workshop had the following objectives:

- Present the current state of development of Artificial Intelligence, its uses, as well as opportunities and challenges for the socio-economic development of the Americas.
- Identify key resources, tools, trainings, projects, and initiatives available for civil society to successfully use AI.
- Engage civil society organizations as part of the ecosystem to develop AI institutional, legal, and regulatory frameworks and applications that are safe, fair, accountable, transparent, and trustworthy.

The workshop started with a 3-hour theory session on Friday March 15, 2024, the session in English was imparted in the morning from 10:00 am to 1:00 pm, and the Spanish session was held from 2:00 pm. The theory session was followed by practical sessions that divided the participants in two groups of 50 participants to facilitate their learning process, these sessions were imparted from Monday, March 18 to Wednesday, March 20, 2024. The last session, held on March 21, 2024, consisted in an open dialogue with Civil Society on the use, development, and deployment of safe, inclusive, and trustworthy AI in the Americas.

Theoretical Session

The theory session provided:

- An introduction to AI, what it is, what it can and cannot do.
- Application of AI in different fields such as education, health, civil rights, sustainable development.
- The ethical considerations of AI, data privacy, transparency, accountability, and governance.

The sessions were imparted in English by Cristian Buc, Gabriela Arriagada, Gonzalo Bustos, and Cristina Flores from CENIA Chile. The Spanish version was imparted by Erick Orozco Acosta and Silvia Moreno Trillos from AUDACIA Center on AI and Robotics in Colombia.

Practical Session

For the practical sessions, the participants were broken into four (4) sub-groups to provide a more personable and firsthand approach on the use of AI tools and software.

During the sessions, instructors covered practical case-studies on the use of IA, ethical considerations to keep in mind, and an hour-long practical activity in which participants learned how to make effective prompts and use AI tools and software such as ChatGPT, Gemini, Bing Chat,

Leonardo AI, and Eleven Labs, to perform tasks related to their day-to-day activities and professional work as civil society organizations and social actors.

The sessions were imparted in English by Sebastian Donoso, Matías Aránguiz, and Cristina Flores from CENIA Chile. The Spanish version was imparted by Erick Orozco Acosta and Silvia Moreno Trillos from AUDACIA, Colombia.

Dialogue

The final session was optional for all registered participants and counted on live interpretation in English and Spanish. This session consisted of a dialogue on the development of an inclusive, ethical, fair, and safe AI for all.

Outcomes

a. Social Media Promotion

Registration to the workshop was promoted through social media Spanish and English on the accounts of the Summit of the Americas (SAS) and @OAS_Development (SEDI).

Tweets received more than 700 views in total from the SAS and SEDI accounts in English and more than 1,300 views in Spanish.

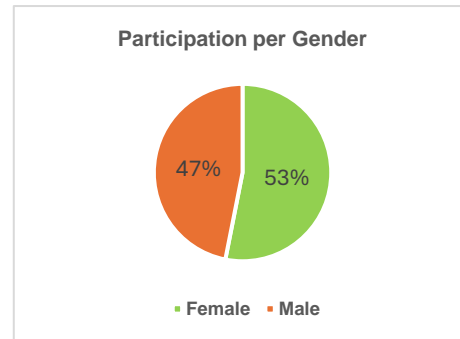
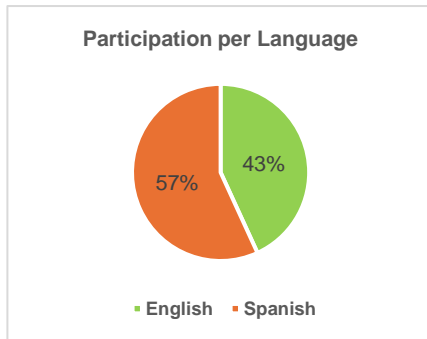


Tweets in Spanish



b. Participants

The total number of participants in the workshop was of 241, from these 137 registered for the Spanish sessions (57%) and 104 for the English sessions (43%). With respect to gender, 53% of the participants identified as female and 47% as male. The workshop had participants from 33 member countries.



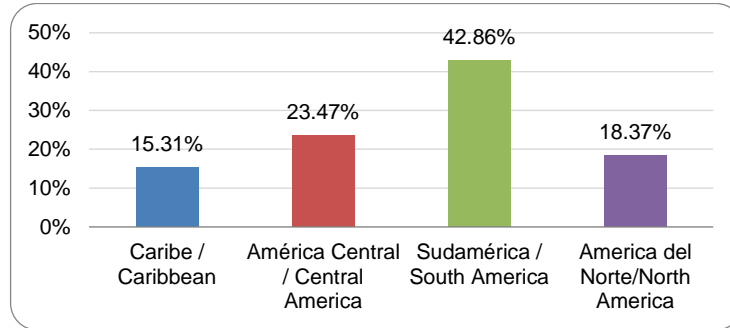
Online Registration

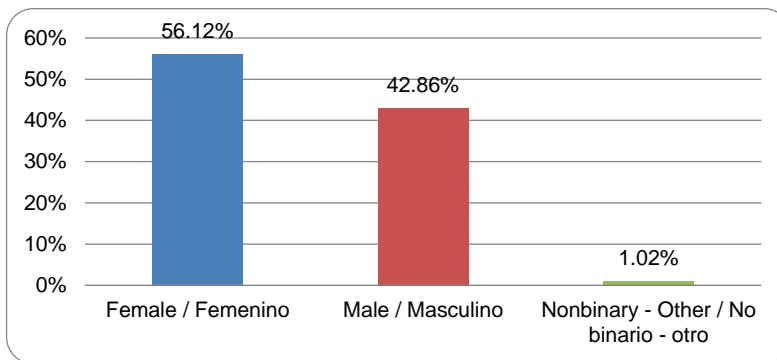

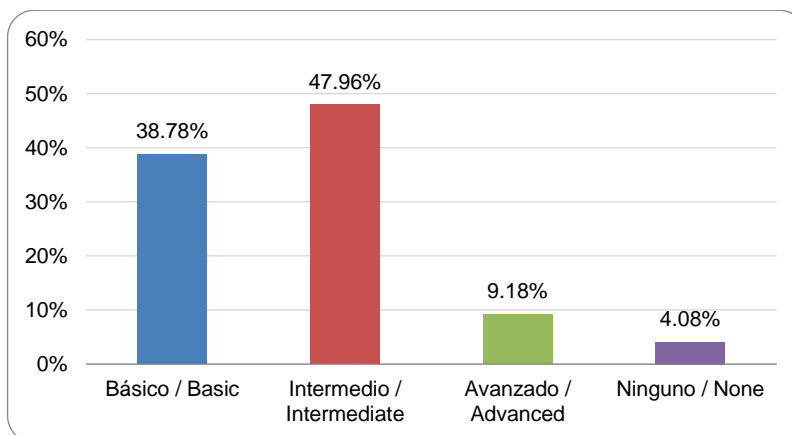
1. *Region of the Americas*



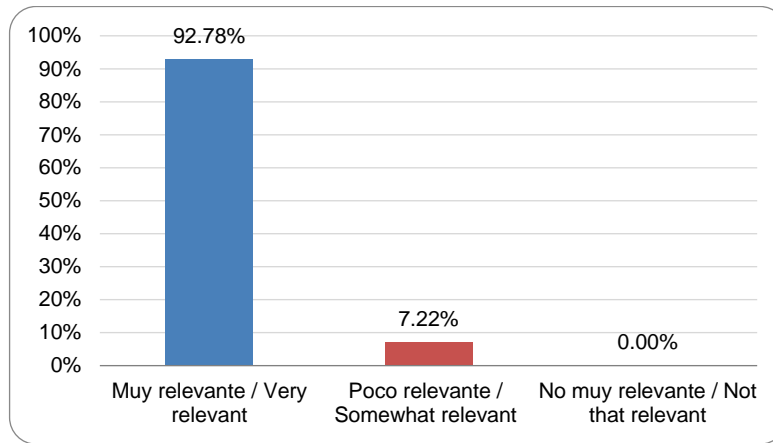
2. *Gender*



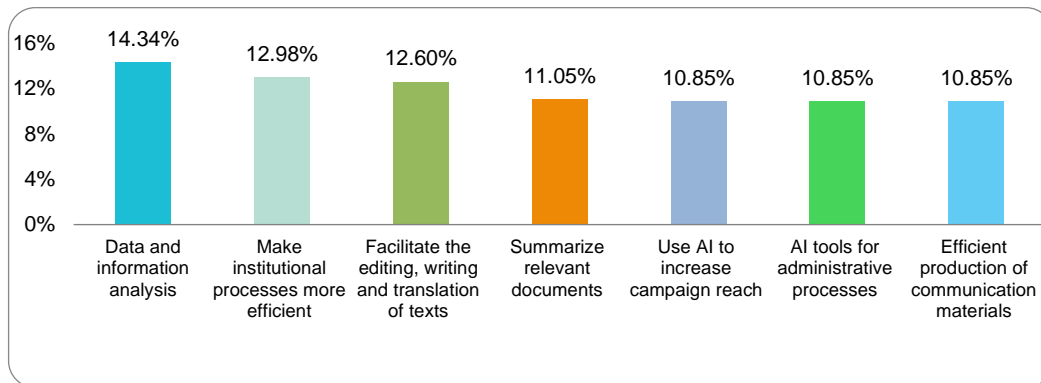
3. *What is your level of familiarity with AI?*



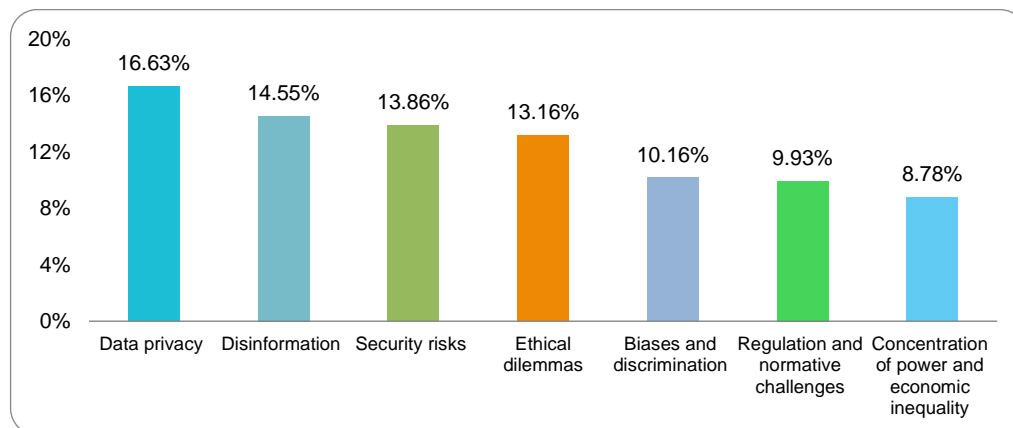
4. Do you think AI can be relevant in your work?



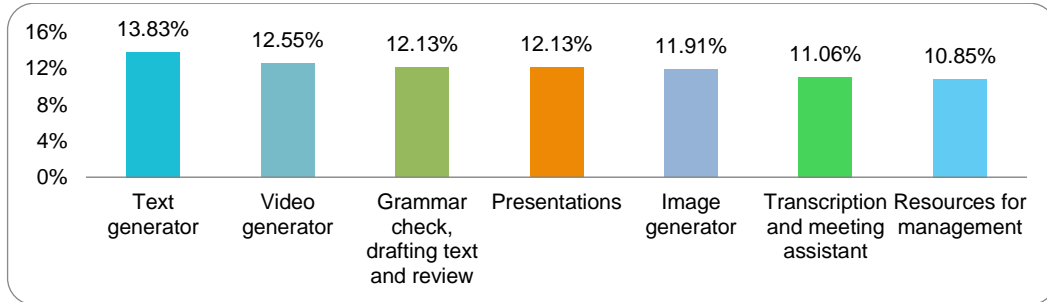
5. How do you think AI can positively impact your work area or that of your organization?



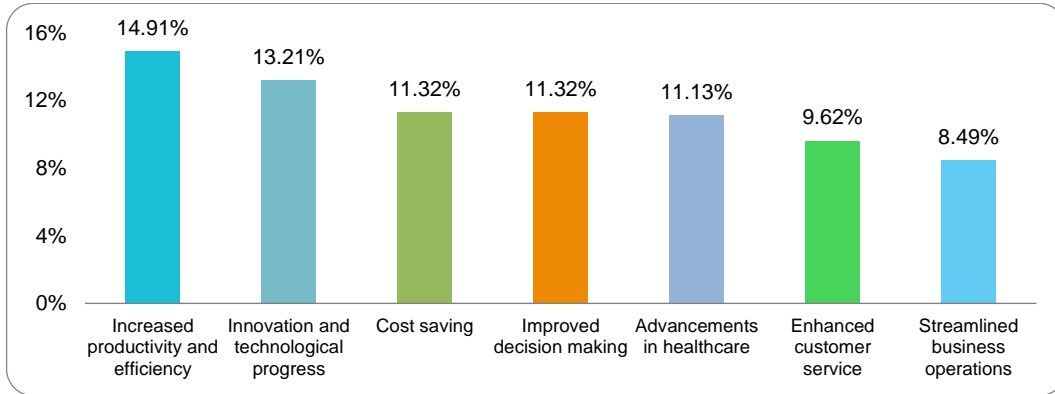
6. What are the major concerns you and/or your organization have regarding AI?



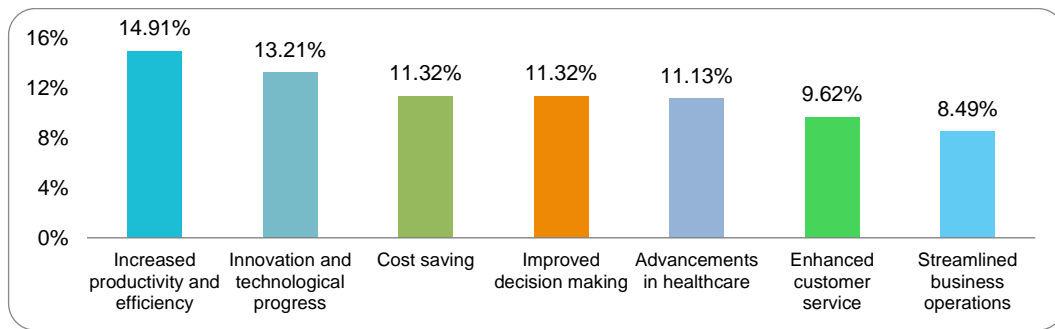
7. Which AI tools are you interested in using?

a. **Promotion and survey**

A total of 104 participants got a certificate from the Capacity Building Workshop “Artificial Intelligence for Civil Society” for Civil Society Organizations and Social Actors and were invited to respond to a voluntary survey with twelve questions.

The aim was to identify its level of satisfaction with various aspects of the workshop, including quality of content and supporting material, format and structure, and duration of the

theoretical and practical sessions. Other aspects referred to the increase in the level of knowledge, supporting materials, and instructor methodology. In addition, considerations about the key takeaway from the workshop, suggestions to improve future capacity-building workshops, and additional comments were incorporated. Lastly, the survey asked how you hear about the program and asked for suggestions of topics for the upcoming Summit Labs.

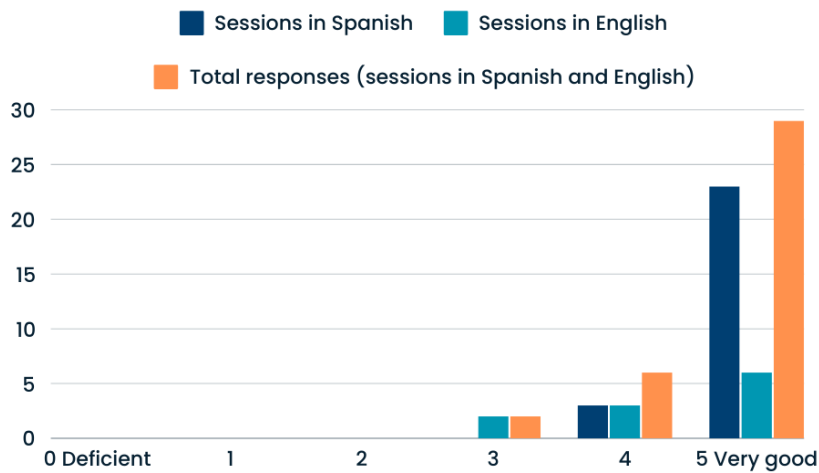
A total of 37 people responded to this query, with 26 participants in the sessions in Spanish taught by AUDACIA and 11 participants in the sessions taught by CENIA. The survey included seven closed questions, as well as five open questions where participants were allowed to address different topics freely.

Graphic 1. Quality of training workshop content

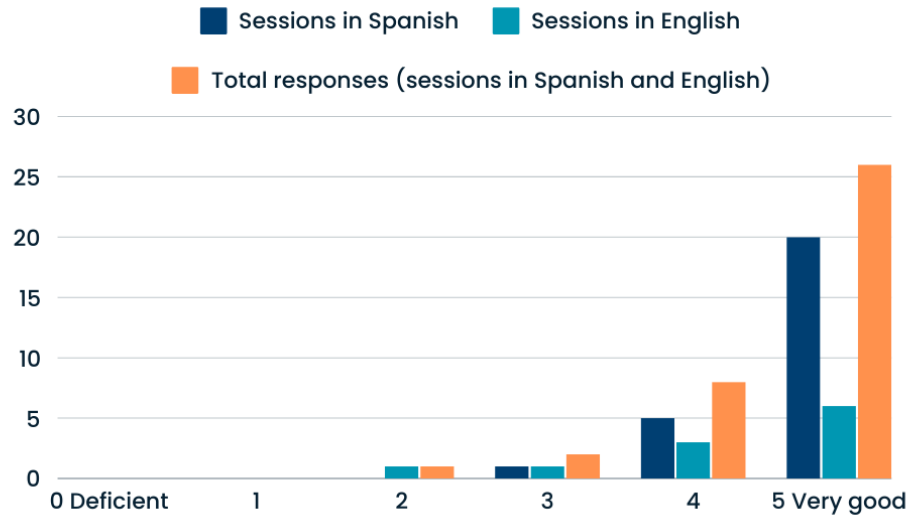

Graphic 2. Format and structure of the workshop

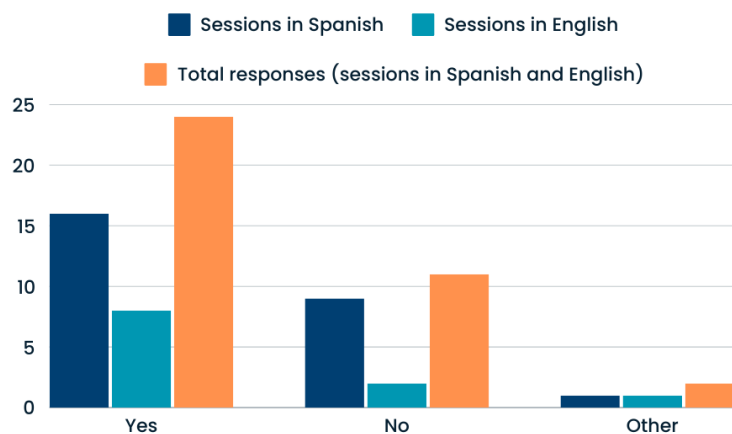

Graphic 3. Duration of the theoretical and practical sessions

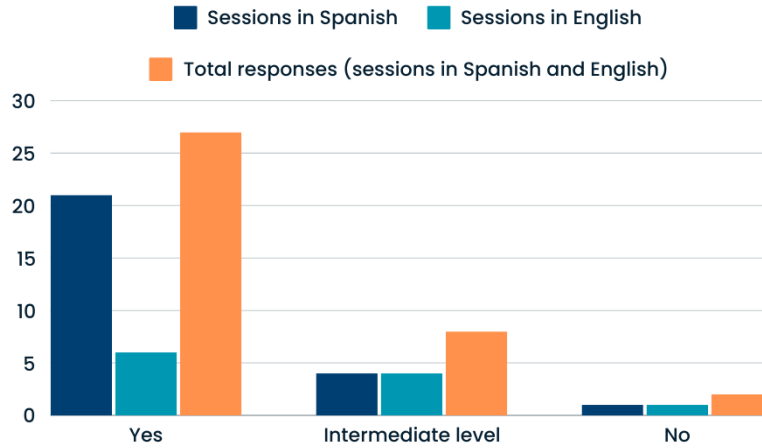

Graphic 4. Increase in the level of knowledge

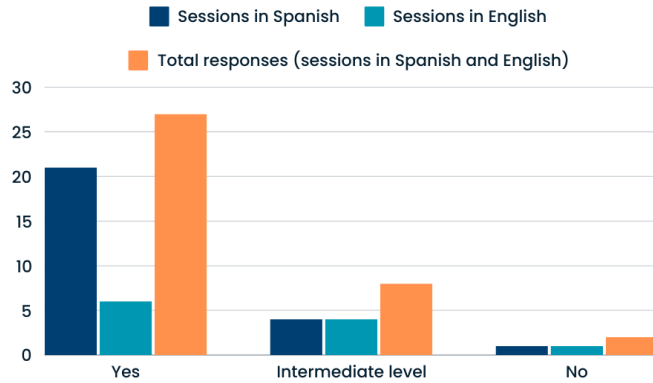

Graphic 5. Supporting materials

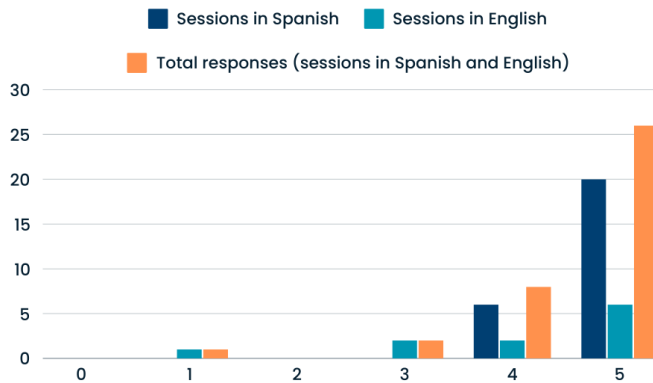

Graphic 6. Instructor methodology



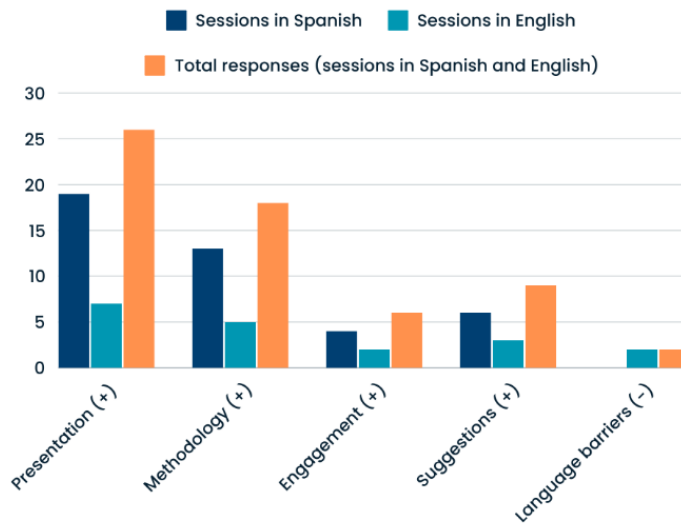
7. Mention the reasons for your answer with respect to the previous question.

Once the information was processed, five predominant categories were identified. Among the positive responses, the evaluations on presentation quality, methodology effectiveness, and appreciation for interaction and engagement stand out. Negative evaluations refer to comprehension problems due to language barriers, specifically to the English skills of CENIA instructors. Finally, the suggestions for improvement pointed to accessibility for people with disabilities, time distribution, access to materials, practical exercises, and addressing complementary topics.

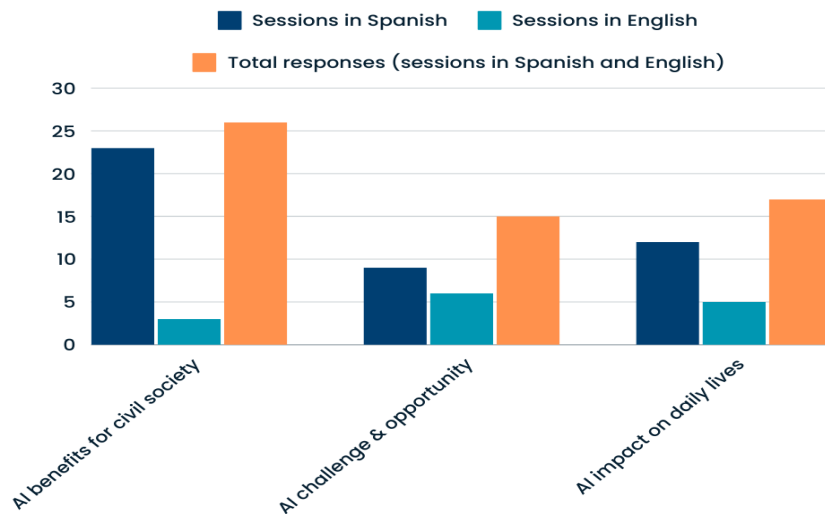
8. **What was the key takeaway from this workshop?**

Graphic 8. Considerations about the key takeaway from the workshop



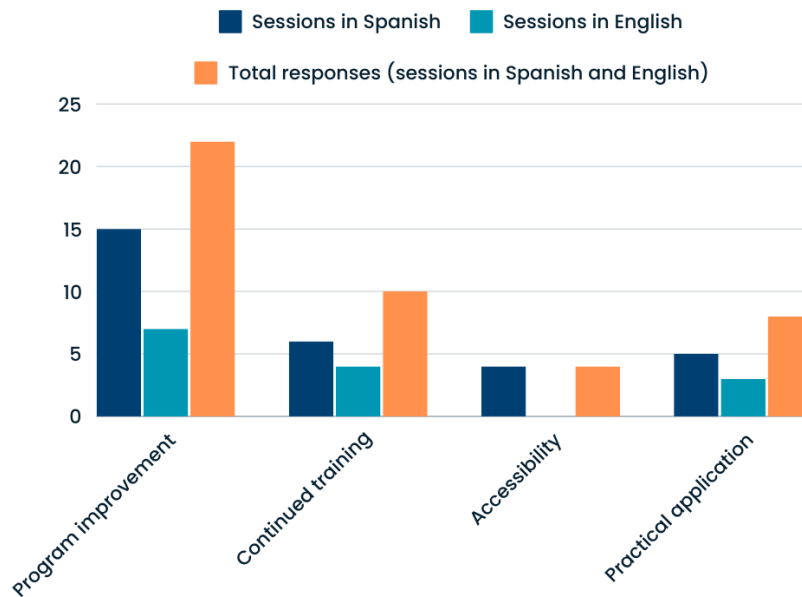
9. Please share your suggestions to improve future capacity building workshops

Graphic 9. Suggestions to improve future capacity building workshops



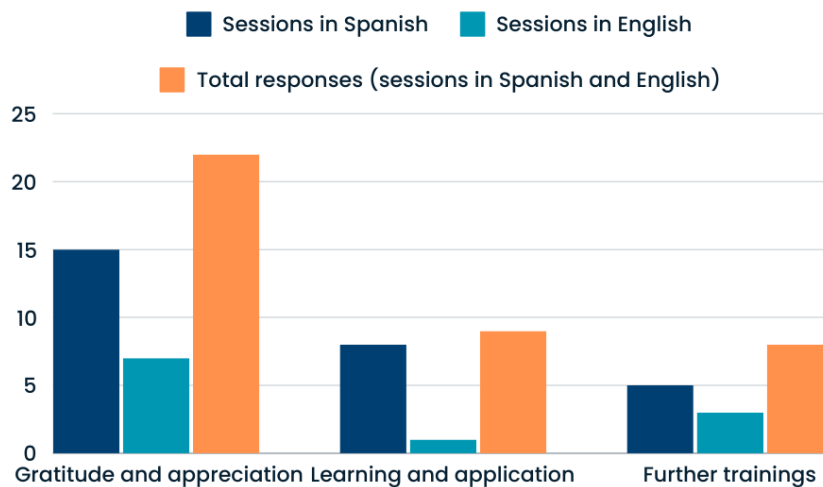
10. Additional comments

Graphic 10. Additional comments

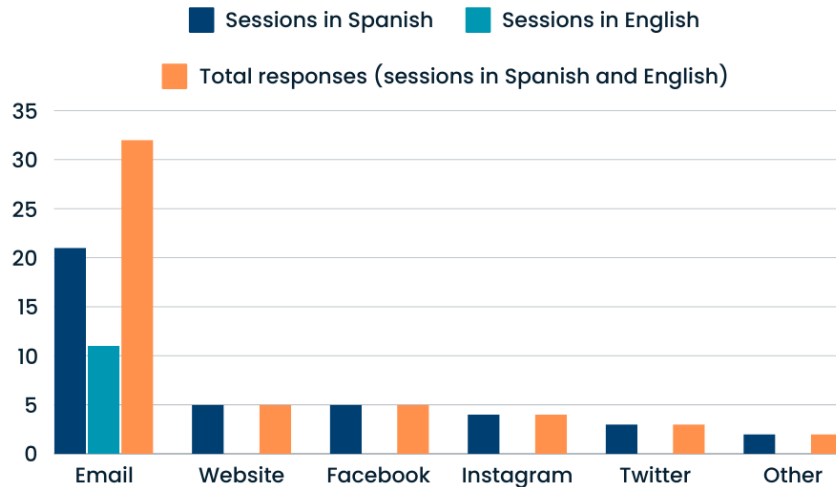

Graphic 11. Hear about the program



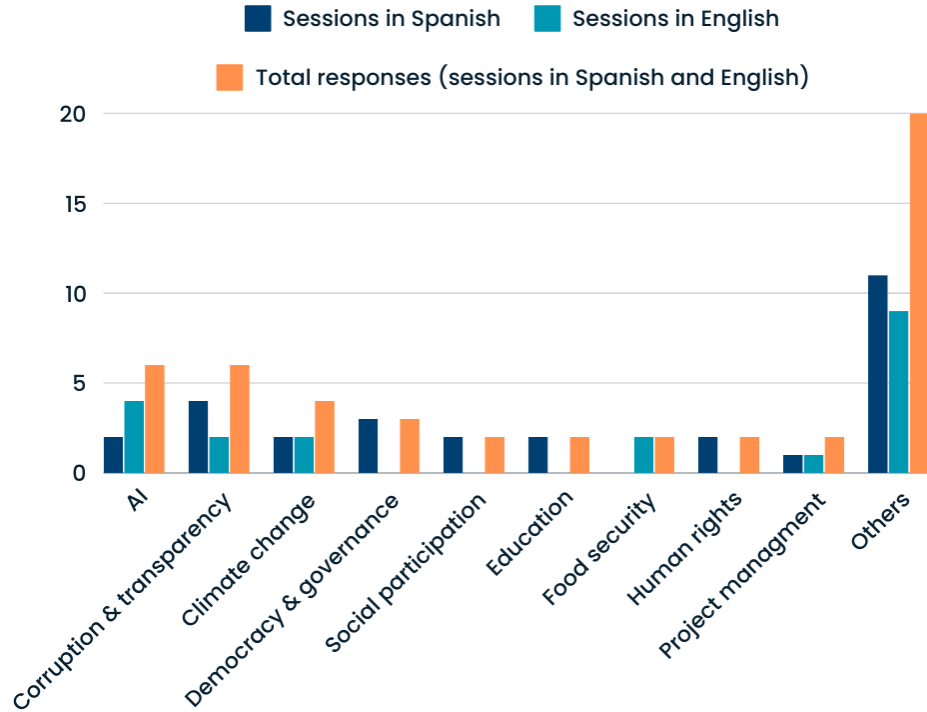
12. What topics would you like to receive training on at the upcoming Summit Labs?

The responses indicated a varied range of suggested themes for the upcoming Summit Labs, reflecting the diverse interests and concerns of respondents. Among the proposed topics, artificial intelligence, and corruption monitoring and transparency were mentioned first. Secondly, climate change, and then, democracy and governance. The topics of social participation, education, food security, human rights, and project management received two mentions each. Lastly, a wide variety of topics have been exposed only once, such as animation, childhood and youth cybersecurity, computer programming, data protection, data science, digital finance and economy, ethics, the future of fossil fuels, international funding, geopolitics, marketing and communication, mediation, mental health, prospective studies, protocol, religious intolerance, renewable energies, robotics, and social inclusion.

Results

The data obtained through the survey demonstrated that the participants majority of the Summit Lab are satisfied with the quality of the training workshop content, the format and structure as well as the duration of the theoretical and practical sessions. Consequently, participants highlighted that their level of knowledge of AI has increased on the topic taught and the material used during the training facilitated their learning process.

Also, the instructor's teaching methodology is predominantly evaluated as very good. Among the positive responses, the evaluations on presentation quality, methodology effectiveness, and appreciation for interaction and engagement stand out. Negative evaluations refer to comprehension problems due to language barriers, specifically to the English skills of CENIA instructors. Finally, the suggestions for improvement pointed to accessibility for people with disabilities, time distribution, access to materials, practical exercises, and addressing complementary topics.

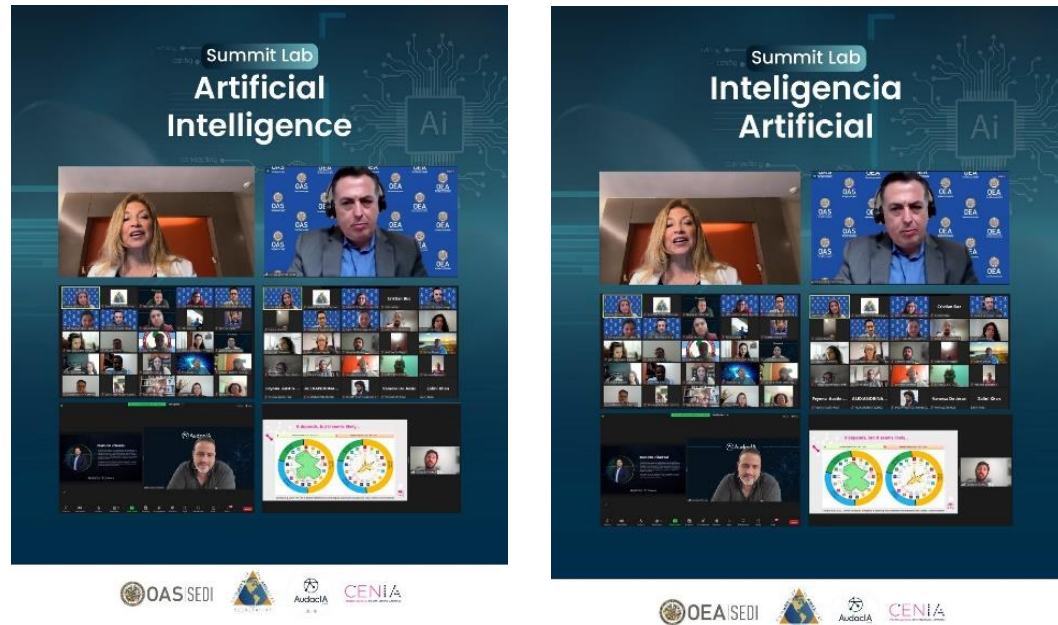
Three predominant categories were identified as the key takeaways from this workshop between participants. Most of the responses pointed out the benefits of AI applied to the work of civil society and social actors. Then, AI as a hemispheric challenge and opportunity as well as the impact of AI on our daily lives from academic and professional analysis.

Moreover, based on the survey responses, participants offered suggestions to enhance the program structure, content, or format, and underlined the importance of continued training and new development opportunities, better practices to promote accessibility and inclusivity, and demands for more practical applications and case studies to be integrated into the following workshop sessions.

Most participants express gratitude and appreciation towards the workshop experience, underlining the positive impact and value derived. Also, participants reflect on their learning and its application in their professional work. Furthermore, there is clear interest in further training or topics, with respondents showing a desire to continue their learning process. Participants recognized the email promotion, the Summit of the Americas Secretariat website, and Facebook as the main sources of information about the Summit Lab, but also Instagram, Twitter, and other sources were mentioned.

Finally, participants expressed their interest in receiving training on a varied range of themes. Among the proposed topics, artificial intelligence, corruption monitoring, and transparency were mentioned first. Secondly, climate change, and then, democracy and governance. The topics of social participation, education, food security, human rights, and project management received two mentions each. Lastly, a wide variety of topics have been exposed only once, such as animation, childhood and youth cybersecurity, computer programming, data protection, data science, digital finance and economy, ethics, the future of fossil fuels, international funding, geopolitics, marketing and communication, mediation, mental health, prospective studies, protocol, religious intolerance, renewable energies, robotics, and social inclusion.

Conclusions

AI is transforming the world’s scientific and technological landscape and revolutionizing every society and industry at the global and local level. The recent evolution and availability of generative AI large language models, such as ChatGPT, Gemini, Bing Chat, and text to image systems like DALL-E and LeonardoAI, have increased the interest and urgency to build capacities and understanding of the implications and functionalities of these tools.

This workshop offered participants the opportunity to gain experience of how to use these resources and how to develop innovative approaches on AI to solve common problems for civil society and social actors of the Americas. At the beginning of the workshop, most of the participants mentioned having a basic knowledge of AI tools that soon evolved into more participants having an intermediate understanding of this technology. Before the workshop, the civil society representative and social actors registered used words such as “scary,” “revolutionary,” “tricky” and “challenging” to describe AI in one word, which then evolved into words such as “ethics,” “important,” “people,” “policies,” “safety,” and “rights.”

Some ideas shared by Civil Society Organizations and Social Actors during the course of the Workshop include the creation of a Regional Network on Artificial Intelligence for the Americas; strategies to promote the participation of women, girls, and other vulnerable population into tech fields; the inclusion of digital alphabetization and training programs on AI as part of basic education curriculums; increased collaboration among the public sector, private sector and civil society to address communities’ needs and challenges through AI; and the development and adoption of a Regional Regulatory Framework for AI in the Americas.
