## **I. Summary**

Between April 16- 18, 2024, the government of the Dominican Republic, the host country of the X Summit of the Americas, together with the Summits Secretariat of the Organization of American States (OAS), organized virtual dialogues with civil society organizations and social actors leading up to the X Summit of the Americas.

Designated as "PrepTalks," these dialogues created a space for civil society to reflect on the challenges and opportunities in the hemisphere, with the aim of offering recommendations and inputs for consideration by the Presidency and participating states of the Summit Process, as well as inputs to enrich discussions within delegations under the Summit Implementation Review Group (SIRG) framework.

On Tuesday April 16<sup>th</sup>, the meeting for the "Mesoamerica" subregion took place, consisting of representatives from civil organizations and social actors from Costa Rica, Cuba, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Mexico, Nicaragua, Panama, and the Dominican Republic. On Wednesday, April 17<sup>th</sup>, representatives from the "Canada, United States, and Caribbean" subregion met, comprising participants from Antigua and Barbuda, Barbados, Belize, Canada, Bahamas, Dominica, United States, Grenada, Guyana, Haiti, Jamaica, Saint Kitts and Nevis, Saint Lucia, Saint Vincent and the Grenadines, Suriname, and Trinidad and Tobago; and from the "Andean" subregion with attendees from Bolivia, Colombia, Ecuador, Peru, and Venezuela. In addition, on Thursday, April 18<sup>th</sup>, civil society organizations and social actors from the "Southern Cone" subregion, including Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Paraguay, and Uruguay, met.

These meetings lasted for two hours each and began with a welcome session and presentation of the objectives of each day by the Secretary of Hemispheric Affairs, Ambassador James Lambert, Vice Minister Rubén Silié, the National Coordinator of Summits of the Dominican Republic and Chair of the Summit Process, as well as the intervention of the Director of the Summits Secretariat, María Celina Conte. The working methodology was agreed upon by the attendees at each meeting. The dynamics included division into working groups, presentation of results, and drafting of a document gathering the corresponding subregion's recommendations. Additionally, at each meeting, participants chose a subregional spokesperson. On April 25<sup>th</sup>, the subregional spokespersons met to agree on the various recommendations and compiled them into a single document.

This report is divided into three sections. The first section presents the general recommendations of the subregional spokespeople gathered on April 25<sup>th</sup>. The second groups the recommendations by subregion gathered between April 16<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup>. Lastly, the list of participants that were present during the PrepTalks is included.

## **II. General recommendations**

### ***TOPIC 1: Strengthening democratic systems with a focus on gender, intersectionality and multi-ethnicity in face of the advance of authoritarianism, corruption and organized crime.***

Given the serious deterioration of democracies and the rise of authoritarianism, the consolidation of democracy in the Americas requires inclusive and equitable participation of gender, intersections and ethnicities, recognizing their needs and experiences. It is essential to guarantee the representation and active participation of women in political decision-making to promote a more just and prosperous society. Furthermore, transparency and accountability are fundamental pillars to combat corruption and strengthen democratic institutions. Prioritizing civil and political rights, the right to assembly and organization, free and transparent elections, checks and balances and institutional strength is crucial to guarantee equality and justice for all citizens within the framework of democracy. Therefore, at the 10th Summit of the Americas, we propose to address these thematic axes: actions to strengthen democratic systems, the participation of women in political decision-making, transparency and accountability, promotion of human rights and actions to stop the advance of authoritarianism in the Americas.

### ***TOPIC 2: Crisis of human mobility due to environmental, political, economic and social causes.***

Given the migration crisis in Latin America and the Caribbean, it is imperative that States implement intergovernmental agreements to protect vulnerable people and guarantee their safety and well-being. The underlying causes of migration, including environmental, political and economic problems, must be addressed through policies that promote sustainable development and stability in the region. In addition, the human rights of migrants and refugees must be respected, ensuring their access to a fair asylum application process, its adequate integration into the transit and host communities and stopping the structural causes that, in some cases, occur due to deliberate actions of the States, such as the practices of persecution, denationalization and imprisonment for reasons policies. In this context, at the 10th Summit of the Americas, it is essential to address this crisis and work on joint solutions to protect migrants and refugees and promote regional stability.

### ***Topic 3: Regulation frameworks, use and exploitation of artificial intelligence (AI) for the reach and enjoyment of human rights, technological development, education, health, the environment, human and labor security.***

At the 10th Summit of the Americas, it is crucial to establish regulatory frameworks that protect the digital rights of all citizens, addressing discrimination, digital violence and online disinformation. Equality of access and use of technology must be guaranteed, as well as digital education and online citizenship promoted. The regulation of artificial intelligence and Internet intermediaries is crucial to prevent mass surveillance and protect the privacy of individuals, thus promoting a safe and ethical digital environment. Therefore, we propose at the 10th Summit of the Americas to work on the implementation of these regulatory frameworks and supervision mechanisms to protect the digital rights of citizens and take advantage of the advance in artificial intelligence for the enjoyment of health, education, protection of the environment and the safety of all people.

### ***TOPIC 4: Strengthening the health and education system with quality services, with comprehensive access to medicines and supplies for all hospital health areas in post Covid recovery.***

After the COVID-19 pandemic, it is a priority to strengthen the health and education systems in the Americas, guarantee universal primary education and protect academic freedom and educational quality that is overwhelmed by authoritarianism in the region, in health it is necessary to ensure equitable access to quality services and essential medicines. Effective regional cooperation is required to harmonize regulations and action plans that guarantee comprehensive and effective medical care. In addition, it is essential to promote biomedical research and the local production of medicines to guarantee the autonomy and health security of the region, as well as guarantee that treatments for degenerative, infectious, and sexual and reproductive health pathologies are given priority. For this reason, we propose at the 10th Summit of the Americas to address this issue and work on joint solutions to strengthen health and education systems in the region.

**TOPIC 5: Monetary and fiscal policies that promote employment and stability.**

Economic policies must prioritize job creation and economic stability in the Americas, especially to address youth unemployment. It is essential that monetary and fiscal policies are aligned to stimulate economic growth and promote job creation. Fiscal and monetary incentives must be implemented that boost business and economic activity, thus generating job opportunities and guaranteeing a decent standard of living for all citizens. Economic policy must focus on the general well-being of the population, seeking guarantees of economic growth at all levels, legal security, respect for private property and individual rights. Therefore, we propose at the 10th Summit of the Americas to address this issue and work on policies that promote employment and economic stability in the region.

### III. Recommendations by subregions

#### a. “Canada, Caribbean and United States” subregion

##### **Theme: Strengthen Regional and Hemispheric Democratic Systems for Effective Inclusion of Civil Society**

Introduction: Canada, Caribbean (English) and the United States submits the following recommendations to member states to be considered for implementation within the 2025 -2028 period or prior to XI summit.

##### **Democracy, Equity and Social justice:**

- **Good Governance.** Enhance citizen participation in developing legal frameworks and decision-making processes. Provide CSOs access to financial resources to strengthen capacity for implementing Summit mandates through grants and contracts and value CSO contributions.
- **Peace and security in the region.** Establish clear guidelines to gain commitments, cooperation and adherence to ensuring peace and security in the region from all member states. These must include Monitoring and Evaluation, Sanctions, Conflict resolution, support for affected communities and dialogue.
- **Gender equality and Inclusion.** As a pillar for building a better future, promote and support Awareness campaigns, Capacity strengthening, Inclusive policies, Youth and vulnerable populations and Expatriate (Diaspora) engagement.
- **Corruption.** Identify and close gaps in policies that enable corruption and develop corrective actions which support advocacy for greater levels of transparency and accountability in the public sector. Strengthen legislation, transparency measures, independent oversight, Whistleblower protection, Collaborate and share good practices.
- **Transparency.** Enhance the capacity of civil society to advocate for and monitor transparency in the public sector by ensuring access to relevant information, technology, partnerships, and campaigns at all levels of the government.

##### **Migration/Immigration:**

Protect the rights of migrants and ensure the enforcement of migrant rights, to guarantee fair and humane treatment across the region. Adhere to regional immigration policies with adequate monitoring.

- **Use of Technology for Reporting Missing People and Identification of Corpses.**

Create a centralized database, leverage mobile apps reporting, social media platforms to raise awareness, utilizing forensic methods.

- **Successful Immersion of Migrants.** Use good practices to promote successful immersion of migrants into the receiving country such as language and culture classes, mentorship, professional skills exchange between migrant and host country, and community engagement initiatives.
- **Review the Economic Impact of Migration:** Use data analytics to analyze the effects on labor markets, public finances, and economic growth, and understand the root cause of migration which extends to economics, conflicts, and environmental data. Use insights

gained to develop policies and interventions aimed at addressing root causes and take corrective actions.

### **Human Rights:**

Recognize and protect the rights of all citizens as outlined in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, inclusive of various forms of Disability and Mental Health. Ensure that Human Rights mandates are adhered to and apply a gender lens to current policies and laws so that they are implemented within the country context harnessing the creativity, expertise, and unique perspectives of indigenous peoples.

- **Universal Human Rights.** Recognize and protect the rights of all citizens as outlined in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and the InterAmerican Charter.

### **Theme: Strengthen Regional and Hemispheric Democratic Systems for Effective Inclusion of Civil Society**

- **Disability and Mental Health.** Ensure the rights of individuals with disabilities and mental health conditions are protected by implementing policies that promote accessibility, provide support services, and combat discrimination.
- **Gender Lens/ gender equity.** Apply a gender lens to current policies and laws to ensure equality and equity.
- **Indigenous Peoples:** Harness the creativity, expertise, and unique perspectives of indigenous peoples by involving, recognizing, and respecting indigenous rights, promoting indigenous participation, and supporting the preservation of indigenous cultures.

### **Economic Development:**

- **Economic Realities and Conditions in the Hemisphere amplifies the importance of maintaining macroeconomic balance.** Economic conditions are often disrupted by natural and other disasters such as pandemics, wars, conflicts and global financial conditions, all of which disrupt the supply chain and food security increasing inflation. Member States must encourage Monetary and Fiscal policies which promote Employment and Price Stability, clear Policy Communication, Open Government data and Transparency.
- **Develop Inclusive and Impactful Policies.** Consider the needs and perspectives of all stakeholders, including marginalized communities and indigenous people. Leverage consultation processes, impact assessments, and mechanisms for ongoing input and feedback.
- **Protect Economic Systems.** Implement strategies to protect and enhance economic systems in the face of environmental challenges.
- **Mitigate risks to social and economic growth posed by increased influx and utilization of drugs in the region** by collaborating with CSOs and other stakeholders to develop national policies and utilizing the expertise of CSOs to design prevention, education and treatment programmes that safeguard productive capabilities of current and future workforce.
- **Equitable Resource Distribution.** Establish mechanisms for the fair distribution of resources, ensuring that benefits of economic development reach marginalized communities. Utilize targeted programs to help develop specific needs of the region.
- **Address Food Insecurity.** Implement strategies to address food insecurity, such as promoting sustainable agriculture, improving food storage and distribution systems, and providing support for small-scale farmers that includes trade and technology tools.



- **Youth Empowerment:** Encourage the involvement of young people in economic, environmental and climate justice initiatives. Utilizing education programs, opportunities for activism, and support for youth-led projects.

**Environment and Climate Justice:**

*Amplify environmental and climate change policies that are inclusive, impactful, protect economic systems and encourage new pathways for equitable distribution of resources which provide economic benefits to and empower marginalized communities.*

**Technology, Open Data & Open Government:**

- Re-commit to develop the appropriate infrastructure to support Open Data and Government Partnership. <https://www.opengovpartnership.org/>
- Continue to support regional collaboration and good practices for Cybersecurity to prevent and eliminate cybercrimes.
- Develop and advance policies that promote the integration of technology inclusive of Information and Communication Technology (ICT) and Advanced Intelligence (AI).

**b. “Mesoamerica” subregion**

1. Crisis stemming from corruption and lack of participatory, plural democracy with anti-corruption mechanisms and mechanisms for restoring the democratic system.
2. Hemispheric security and peace.
3. Fostering universal justice amidst serious human rights violations and crimes against humanity.
4. Human mobility crisis: migration, forced displacement (caused by economic, environmental, and political factors), cases of stateless persons in the Americas, extortion and insecurity *en route*, especially for groups in vulnerable situations – women and children among them.
5. Access to refuge and asylum within transit and host countries, including crosscutting legal certainty.
6. Cross-border and extraterritorial enforcement, including extradition as a means of persecution for countries under authoritarian regimes, such as Venezuela, Cuba, and Nicaragua.
7. Human rights and collective rights, as well as self-determination of indigenous peoples and people of African descent and indigenous social justice.
8. Climate justice, rights of nature, responsibility for increasing extractivism, and corporate accountability mechanisms.
9. Strengthening civil society and protection systems for defenders and CSOs amid the shutdown of civic spaces and limited access to resources (including attacks on freedom of expression).
10. Strengthening the inter-American human rights system and the democratic agreements framework (Inter-American Democratic Charter).
11. Transnational organized crime.
12. Frameworks for using and harnessing artificial intelligence (AI) for the attainment and exercise of human rights, technological development, education, health, the environment, and human and occupational safety.
13. Gender justice, LGBTIQ+ rights, and advancing sexual and reproductive health and rights.
14. Mechanisms for follow-up on civil society participation in the Summits mechanism and commitments made by states, and ensuring they are accountable.
15. Universal access to basic services (education, health, and a healthy environment).
16. Improved access to health services as a fundamental human right, especially with regard to infectious diseases, as part of the SDGs.

**c. “Andean” subregion**

For the Tenth Summit of the Americas, it is recommended that the following topics be addressed from a human-rights perspective and in a way that recognizes different ways of addressing intersectionalities and includes gender mainstreaming.

**1. Strengthening democracy in the Americas through active citizen participation**

In most Latin American countries, the results of the fight against corruption are unsatisfactory, as evidenced by the 2023 Corruption Perception Index<sup>1</sup> and the 2021 country reports presented by the Citizen Corruption Observatory,<sup>2</sup> which addressed compliance with the Lima Commitments.<sup>3</sup> This problem must be confronted by the Heads of State and Government to ensure strong principles governing transparency and citizen participation in our democracies.

Democratization in the Americas is an ever-evolving process that requires the active participation of all stakeholders, including governments, civil society, and the general public.

We propose the following core issues:

- Citizen participation in political decision making
- Transparency and accountability
- Human rights and diversity.

**2. Multidimensional security<sup>4</sup>**

We consider it a priority to transcend the classic scheme of security and defense and move toward public policies and multilateral approaches that address the challenges in a comprehensive manner, avoiding exclusive focus on protection against external threats. Multidimensional security recognizes the variety of risks and challenges that people face in their daily lives, from poverty and critical food shortages to health-related and political challenges, physical violence, environmental degradation and specific regional problems such as crime, organized crime, contract killing, kidnapping and drug trafficking, as well as the impunity that exists in these realities.

Multidimensional security promotes an equitable approach, ensuring that all people, regardless of their geographic location or socioeconomic status, have access to safe and satisfactory living conditions. It is essential to open the debate to include issues of common interest, such as migration, asylum, complementary protection measures for social actors, civic spaces, and civil society organizations.

4. Multidimensional security is a concept that encompasses various dimensions of security, extending beyond national security and defense to encompass a broader range of aspects and concerns that directly affect our countries and their citizens.

### **3. Education and technological access to strengthen civil society organizations in the Americas**

Guaranteeing the right to education is fundamental for sustainable development and social equity in the Americas. This principle is essential for programs that promote training in new technologies, enabling civil society organizations and social actors to expand their impact and reach.

It is crucial to democratize Internet access for all communities, especially the most vulnerable, and to educate the voting public about their rights and responsibilities, ensuring transparent electoral processes.

Such actions strengthen democratic foundations and allow everyone to benefit from technological and educational advances.

### **4. Sustainable development and environmental resilience in the Americas**

Comprehensive measures for sustainable development, encompassing climate change mitigation, adaptation and ecological restoration, are essential. Strengthening resilience through nature-based solutions, clean technologies, and the implementation of the circular economy is crucial.

In addition, fostering international cooperation for the sustainable management of transboundary watersheds helps to protect vital resources such as water. Promoting clean energy generation with the active participation of ethnic and local communities, as well as adhering to international treaties that protect these groups and the environment, are essential actions to ensure effective and equitable environmental progress.

### **5. Promoting equity in access to health care in the Americas: Challenges and opportunities for the well-being of all citizens**

Health is a fundamental and essential right for the well-being and development of a society. However, unequal access to health remains a significant problem in the Americas, affecting millions of people. Many citizens face barriers to access to quality health services as a result of socioeconomic, geographic, gender-related, and other factors.

Promoting equal access to health not only improves individual well-being, but also contributes to sustainable development and overall prosperity in the region. Addressing this challenge requires the cooperation and commitment of all the countries of the Americas. It represents a vital opportunity to work together on the creation of fairer, more inclusive and accessible health systems, thus guaranteeing a better future for all citizens.

**It is important to emphasize that the gender and diversity perspective should be a cross-cutting theme of all thematic proposals.**

**d. “Southern Cone” subregion**

**On the democratic system and democratic governance**

**Priority issues**

1. The region’s democratic framework is under attack on multiple fronts, which weakens social cohesion and the guarantee of rights to different groups, increases in communities and society at large, and adversely affects the quality and transparency of institutions.

**Recommendation:**

- 1.1 Address organized crime as a priority on the regional agenda, which includes drug trafficking, narcoterrorism, the rise in criminal gangs, and the so-called “narco-state” (where drug trafficking co-opts authorities), all of which undermine internal security while circulating regionally, operating between countries.
  - 1.2 States urgently need to promote a direct, interagency counterdrug policy that targets its illicit businesses and ramifications, taking into account experiences in the region.
  - 1.3 Give special consideration to measures against corruption, as a facilitator of these serious problems.
  - 1.4 Draw up a status report on the commitments adopted by States in the Summits framework and consider the active participation of civil society.
2. The proliferation of disinformation poses a critical challenge to democracy, digital rights, and human rights. The use of artificial intelligence in the generation of information amplifies this problem, which is exacerbated by a lack of regulation of internet intermediaries. There is a growing threat of mass surveillance that undermines the rights, individual freedoms, and privacy of all citizens in our countries.

**Recommendation:**

- 2.1 It is very important that the international community, in collaboration with regional forums and national governments, work on the implementation of robust regulatory frameworks and monitoring and oversight mechanisms to protect the digital rights of all citizens, by taking action against discrimination, intersectional violence, hate speech, and disinformation on digital networks and media.
- 2.2 Disinformation as a serious problem, given the shift in the sources of information on which people rely from traditional to digital media (networks, influencers), and the need for regulation and action on the part of States to address inequality and barriers to access and use, giving rise to the so-called “digital divide,” which even influences the management of people's health.

### **Recommendation**

- 2.3 The provision by States of digital means is necessary to ensure digital access for citizens to effectively exercise their rights, with special attention to the most vulnerable.
3. Situations of violence experienced by women, girls, and other vulnerable groups throughout the region.

### **Recommendation**

- 3.1 Strengthen policies, programs and actions in the States to eradicate violence against women, girls and vulnerable groups, giving priority to budget allocation for mechanisms and programs that comprehensively address physical, psychological, and sexual violence and prevent femicide.
- 3.2 Give particular consideration to measures against gender and intersectional violence in the digital, institutional, obstetric, and workspaces, and especially against political violence suffered by women and young people, which carries a high cost for democracy and the constitutional rule of law.
4. Faced with the crisis affecting the democratic system, studies, strengthening programs, and monitoring should be promoted. This implies ensuring accountability of state actors and agencies, as well as ensuring compliance with their functions in the context of the weakening of democracy. It is important to enable an active role for civil society organizations committed to democratic values, as well as expanding their meaningful participation.

### **Recommendations:**

- 4.1 Strengthen institutions, especially the role of the courts in the democratic system and their independence from other powers. This includes ensuring access to justice for the most disadvantaged groups.
- 4.2 It is important to agree on new accountability mechanisms and to monitor compliance with the commitments adopted by States in Summits instruments and agreements.
- 4.3 Set up innovation groups at the regional level to address the complex problem of corruption, courses of action, and awareness.
- 4.4 Support the development of action frameworks against narco-coopted political structures and their impact on electoral processes and the system of democratic representation.

- 4.5 Strengthen the role of free, pluralistic, and independent media and information in democracies.
  - 4.6 Develop responses to address threats to the civic space and pluralistic dialogue in both the physical and the digital domain.
5. Education at all levels forms the foundation of democratic life and access to improved living conditions. It is a right that encompasses access to democratic values and necessitates the appropriate allocation of resources to prevent the deterioration of the education system.

**Recommendation:**

- 5.1 Education at all levels is fundamental for the progress of States and democratic life. It serves as a space for learning the values of social coexistence, without discrimination or hate speech. Adequate funding is therefore critical to sustain inclusive, peaceful, and egalitarian societies that enable social mobility and access to better working conditions in democratic societies.
6. The right to health of citizens in the region is in crisis. Ensuring the right to health is key to guaranteeing life.

**Recommendation:**

- 6.1 The right to health requires States to ensure access and guarantee the provision of medications to the public, especially the most vulnerable groups.
